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Part 1 Of 3: Summer Safety For Pets **Pet Safety In The Heat**

Prevention is vital in keeping our pets safe and healthy. The warmer months can be uncomfortable and sometimes hazardous for pets, but there are many easy ways to prepare for, and avoid, the dangers of summer. Safety in the Heat

Dogs can overheat easily and can't cool themselves off as efficiently as we can. Preventing heat stroke is far easier than treating it. Make sure your dog has shade when outside and unlimited access to fresh water. Try a kiddie pool! Your dog will be able to cool off and get a drink when it heats up. If you have a real pool, don't leave your dog unsupervised, don't let them drink from it and make sure to rinse off chemicals after each swim.

If you leave your pet home alone, fans are often not enough as they do not cool dogs and cats the way they cool people. Our pets enjoy air conditioning as much as we do, but many of our Lakewood homes aren't equipped. Try a cooling pad or set them up with a cold spot in the basement or on a bathroom floor. Make sure they have cold, fresh water and check on them often. Ask a neighbor to let you know if there is a power outage when you're not home and your pets are shut inside the house. During warm weather, please remember these tips to keep your pet cool:

Offer access to unlimited fresh

water! Animals should always have fresh, clean water available. Bring portable water bowls on walks and car rides.

- Provide shade when outside.

- To avoid hot pavement, try a 5 second test; if it's too hot for your feet, it's too hot for theirs.

- Limit exercise or take walks early in the morning or late at night.

- Keep all of your windows screened so your pets don't fall out.

- Apply sunscreen, especially to dogs with thin coats.

Signs that an animal is overheated:

- Excessive panting/difficulty breathing
- Rapid heartbeat/respiration
- Drooling
- Mild weakness, stupor or collapse
- Seizures, bloody diarrhea or vomit - A body temperature of over 104 degrees

Breeds with flat faces (pugs, bulldogs, Persian cats) and those with dark or thicker coats are more likely to struggle with dehydration and heat stroke because they can't cool themselves down as effectively as others. These breeds, as well as elderly or overweight pets and those who suffer from heart or lung disease should spend as much time as possible in air conditioned rooms.

If your animal is experiencing heat stroke, the first thing to do is get them out of the heat. Then you'll want to use cool (not cold) water to bring their temperature down, either in the tub or with wet rags on the back of the neck and in the groin area. Having these tips in mind will allow you to act quickly in an emergency.

NEVER Leave Your Pet Unattended in the Car.

Your vehicle can get dangerously hot very quickly, causing your animal organ damage or even death. Rolling down the windows has little effect, according to The Humane Society of the United States. When it's 72 degrees Fahrenheit outside, the temperature inside your car can heat up to 116 degrees Fahrenheit within an hour. When it's 80 degrees Fahrenheit outside, the temperature inside your car can heat up to 99 degrees Fahrenheit within 10 minutes. Your pet just isn't safe alone in the car.

Even if you think it's cool enough to leave your dog in the car, someone else could disagree. Lakewood Animal Control fields calls from Good Samaritans non-stop in the summer. "You could leave your pet in the car for one minute and someone will call us," says Animal Control Officer Kurt Bialosky. "Leave them at home."

If you see a pet stuck in a hot car, here are some steps you can take to help:

- Get the make, model and license plate number.

- Go into nearby businesses and ask management to make an announcement

to find the owner.

- If the owner can't be found immediately, and you think the animal is in danger, call Animal Control at (216) 529-5020.

The key to ensuring the safety of our pets during the summer is keeping a watchful eye on them. The change of season brings new challenges but all of these potential dangers can be prevented. Keep in mind that our animals are totally reliant on us to keep them out of harm's way. Have a happy and healthy summer with your pets!

Senator Skindell Casts Vote To Certify **Congressional Redistricting Ballot Issue**

On May 30, 2017 State Senator Michael J. Skindell (D-Lakewood), in his role as a member of the State Ballot Board, voted to certify a proposed constitutional amendment to change Ohio's system of drawing congressional districts. The vote, which was unanimous, means the group backing the proposal can begin collecting signatures to place the issue on the ballot next year.

"The gerrymandering of our state's congressional districts creates more parfind common ground on issues affecting Ohioans on a daily basis," said Senator Skindell, who made the motion for the board to certify the ballot issue. "I am pleased Ohio voters are a step closer to having the opportunity to decide if it is the right time to make reforms."

The proposal is modeled after a ballot issue voters approved in 2015 that changed the process of drawing Ohio's state legislative districts. That

plan created a seven-member bipartisan commission made up of legislators and statewide elected officials, and set new guidelines for drawing maps to limit gerrymandering.

The group pushing for the congressional redistricting ballot issue will need to collect 305,591 valid signatures of registered voters from at least 44 of Ohio's 88 counties to qualify for the ballot.

Schools LHS Mourns Loss Of Madison The Therapy Dog

The Lakewood High School community suffered a tremendous loss on April 27 when Madison the Therapy Dog passed away. Madison had been a staff member at LHS for five years, working with Julie Koponiski, her owner. Koponiski is an Intervention Specialist in the school's Reading Lab, which serves students grade 9-12 who are in Individualized Education Programs (IEPs). Madison has helped hundreds of kids over the years by relieving stress, encouraging student interaction and facilitating calming in the classroom.

Madson's amazing story began over eight years ago. On December 11, 2008 Konopinski was driving on Detroit Avenue in Cleveland. She saw a frantic stray dog running close to West Blvd. "I turned my car around to go look for her, and she was gone. I drove up and down nearby streets, until I saw her." The dog had gone south on West Boulevard to Madison Avenue. "When her eyes met mine, she bolted across the street to me. She was sideswiped by a car, hurling her body across the street." Julie and her husband examined the dog, who luckily was not hurt. They took her home and decided to call her "Madison" the name of the street where she was found.

Julie recognized that Madison had many traits to become a therapy dog. She pursued therapy dog certification

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through Therapy Dog International, an organization dedicated to the regulating, testing, and registration of therapy dogs. Julie and Madison participated in six weeks of training. The certification involved passing 15 different tests. Madison passed with flying colors. A few months later, she was accepted by Lakewood City Schools as the first therapy dog at Lakewood High School. Konopinski credits former LHS Principal William Wagner with helping make Madison's role possible. Current Principal Keith Ahearn also embraced Madison.

Madison became a fixture at LHS, coming to work daily and interacting with the staff and students. A few weeks ago Koponiski noticed that Madison wasn't feeling quite right. Veterinary tests eventually discovered that Madison had developed a brain tumor. She died on the morning of April 27, a Thursday. Koponiski, deeply attached to Madison as both a pet and co-worker, didn't come into work that day or the following. The next Monday she broke the news to her students.

The news quickly spread throughout the LHS community, triggering an outpouring of calls, text messages, emails, cards, and letters. Koponiski, who herself was still grieving, found comfort in the support. "Seeing how much she touched so many people here," she said, "it's like I'm grieving with hundreds of people." Some of the messages reflected the deep impact Madison had on some students' lives. "One kid wrote that Madison was the first friend they made at Lakewood High," said Koponi-

ski. For some of the students, this is their first experience dealing with death. "I'm trying to be a healthy role model for grief," said Koponiski.

A Madison memorial board was placed in the Reading Lab. It has many of the notes, pictures, and even original artwork done by students to remember their canine friend. The tributes continue to roll in for Madison. Mr. Ahearn is having a plaque made in Madison's honor so that future students will know her story. A collection is taking place to have a dogwood tree planted on the LHS grounds in Madison's honor. A memorial service is also being considered.

Some have already asked if there will be a new therapy dog at the LHS Reading Lab in the future. No decisions have been made on that, as everyone is still processing the loss of Madison. If you'd like to learn more or see tributes to Madison, visit her on Twitter and Instagram @barkingranger.

Community's "Can Do" Attitude: Why I Love Teaching In Lakewood

Hello, I'm Sean McGuan. I've taught fourth or fifth grade in Lakewood City Schools (LCS) for 24 years. I am not a native of Lakewood but I am a native Clevelander and have lived in Lakewood for 25 years. I married my college sweetie from freshman year and we have two children at Lakewood High, a junior and a sophomore. With May being the month of Teacher Appreciation Week, I wanted to write this article to reflect and share my ideas about what continues to motivate and make me value being a Lakewood teacher.

Sometimes I think of my classroom as a bus stop where the 9-10 year olds get off, stay for awhile and then move on to the next stop. The life of a 10-year-old has changed during the last 24 years. "iPad? What's an iPad" to "Mr. McGuan, can we code today?" However, a fifth grade student is still basically the same person in 2017, as they were in 1994. They want to be respected, challenged, have fun and be prepared for middle school, and knowing my colleagues, I can say we meet these student goals.

Fulfilling the needs of students is what motivates me each day of the school year, but even when I'm not teaching, I'm doing anything I can to strengthen the learning experiences of the students. For example, I have my eyes and ears open for information to support the fifth grade curriculum and search for new places to visit on field trips. This strategy led to all four fifth grade classrooms participating in a program entitled, "The Reasons for the Seasons" at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History's planetarium. In addition to these personal practices, I'm supported by the professionalism of the Board of Education, Lakewood City Schools' staff, the desire parents have for their children to reach their dreams, and the "We can do this!" energy of this community. These four components make for an invaluable Lakewood teaching experience.

The commitment of Lakewood teachers and staff to the community has not wavered during my tenure in the district. As a freshman teacher, I admired the strength of the administration. They supported the staff by providing on-site professional development and up-to-date text and digital resources. These practices continue today. For instance, LCS offer teachers the chance to take classes taught by their peers. Teachers can explore curricular programs in greater depth, learn new strategies to incorporate technology into the classroom,

or study timely topics such as understanding issues about race. Another example of forward-thinking commitment is the district moving from each school having a computer lab to having an almost one-toone ratio of computers to students in nearly all buildings in the district.

Lakewood parents trust Lakewood teachers to lead their children to achieving their dreams because they've seen the results, whether in artistic, academic or extracurricular endeavors and know the Lakewood staff will never let a student down.

Parents know they can count on the school board, administrators, teachers and support staff of Lakewood to continue the legacy demonstrated by our predecessors of protecting and promoting the value of these programs by successfully leading the way for our students to achieve superior results. Lakewood bands and orchestras receive the highest marks at music contests. Lakewood artists win scholarships and national recognition for their work. Clubs such as Model U.N., or the Academic Challenge team receive high honors at their competitions.

Lakewood teachers find the spark within each student and build that spark to a successful academic or extracurricular blaze. The Board, administration and staff are relentless advocates for administering sound instructional and extracurricular practices to support all student populations. Before and after school programs of all types are created, such as Project MORE to support reading growth. Specialized internal programs, such as the Gifted and Talented and Advanced Placement programs support learners needing advanced educational opportunities. The middle school Mock Trial teams have taken high honors for years at the annual competition in Columbus. The athletic department, with our fine coaches, enables Lakewood athletes to reach the highest levels of competition, such as breaking high school records, and leading student-athletes that wish to compete collegiately to reach those dreams.

The final and most important example of what motivates me to teach in Lakewood is the tremendous and continuous community support the district

dents in the schools by passing levy and bond issues. Not a single active school building in the district is over 15 years old. The seven elementary schools have been either refurbished or rebuilt. And refurbished doesn't mean a new coat of paint. Buildings such as Horace Mann and Emerson Elementary Schools were completely rebuilt from the inside-out. These results were because the Lakewood community, a la LeBron, supported not one, not two, but three bond issues. Nothing more can demonstrate how much Lakewood supports and values its schools than when families make a financial commitment to their schools. Thank you!

In closing, I trace my motivation and value of being a teacher to a day early in my career. There was an administrator by the name of Rick Wair, who was the assistant superintendent. He spent the majority of his career teaching and being an administrator in the Mansfield-Ashland area of Ohio, but then moved up for a chance to shine in our fair city. (He did.)

One day, while I was at new teacher orientation, Rick was welcoming and introducing the new teachers to the community. During his main presentation, Rick remarked that he learned quickly that there is a mystique to Lakewood City Schools and the community. Rick believed there was something about the schools and community that you can't put your finger on, but you know it when you live it and see it. There is an esprit de corps feeling that says, "We can do this!"

It's that energy that has carried me through nearly a quarter century of being a Lakewood teacher.

Obligatory Disclaimer: Record reviews are a tricky business. It's one thing to enjoy music, but to, like, pick out what you like about it? That being said, if I review your thing and I didn't like something, don't feel too bad. My opinion doesn't matter all that much.

Let me start off this review by saying I have no idea what band is supposed to come first here. While the album cover lists Goldmines first, the runout etchings say that Shitbox Jimmy's side is A. For my more casual readers (i.e. the ones that have never spoken to me in person), this annoys me more than you could possibly fathom. I guess I'm going with Goldmines for now, but that could change. As someone who wasn't head over heels for Goldmines' previous 12" like it seemed like a lot of people were, Goldmines do one heck of a job here. "We Real Cool," with choruses based on the poem of the same name, has lots of guitar from Mandy Look and Jeanna Lax, which is always appreciated. Meanwhile,

from every other band she's also in) really kills it on the drums with an especially bombastic performance while Heather Gmucs holds it all down with a darn good bassline. It's mega catchy and I would go so far as to say it's Goldmines' best song. Though the two songs that follow it don't quite live up to all that, they're both still good. "Shadow" is another catchy indie rocker, with an instrumental bit that kinda reminds me of "Psychotic Reaction" for some reason. Something about the rhythm, maybe? "Not The Lion" has got a cool ominous melody that's both sung and played by the lead guitar. I think Goldmines go three for three here. Like 'em or not, I think it's undeniable that they have some darn catchy tunes. Then ya flip the record over and Shitbox Jimmy start their side of things with an utter killer as well. "Later" is just about everything you'd want in a power pop song. It's just a crusher. On "Try Save," they get a little more garage-rockin' but it's still mega pop, and Joey Nix reminds you that just because he's playing power pop these days doesn't mean he's a wimp, he

chorus- actually, I like almost everything about this song. They're really taking things in a power pop direction these days as opposed to their earlier straight garage rock sound. I suspect (actually, I don't need to suspect, I confirmed this) that Drew (that's Ritchey, the one who plays guitar and sings sometimes, not Siegel, the one who plays drums) is at least a little responsible for this. Their third tune here, "Do You Wanna" is probably the weakest song on the whole record, but for a weakest link it's still a pretty good song. I do like the little quiet part, though this tune and the last one, "Teenage Daughter" prove that even the clean, bright production that John Delzoppo did here can't render what Joey's saying comprehensible. Oh well, that's just part of his charm. Hey, speaking of "Teenage Daughter," you're not gonna believe this: it's another good power pop tune. The drums on the choruses provide an interesting rhythmic element that is not quite what you'd expect, but it works real well. Drew Siegel and bassist Jake Grace do a darn good job holding down the rhythm on this one. This band (actually, both bands here) has been around long enough that they know what they're doing. Also, I think in verse two, Joey doesn't say even one real word, but I'm willing to be corrected. As someone who was a big fan of "Deliverance" and "The Movie," it took me a few listens to come around to their new sound, but I got there. You probably will too. I think this record as a whole gets better with each listen. Hold on, can I say "darn good" one more time? Darn good. 4.8/5

Time To Add Labrador Retrievers To List Of Banned Dogs In Lakewood

I've been doing a lot of research lately on dogs. As an animal photographer, I do my best to research all breeds so that I have a full understanding of them. It's helpful to go into a session having a good feel for a dog's disposition.

Lately I've been researching dog bite stats. I get my information from the local news and the internets. I see the pit-bull maulings. And lately, I've noticed many more Labrador Retriever bites. For some reason, these news websites differentiate between the dogs. When a pit hurts someone, it's called a mauling. When a lab or other dog hurts someone, it's typically called a bite or attack by the news.

Even though the average person can't identify a pit-mix, the news runs with what they say. Don't blame them. They're local news and they need the advertising dollars. Pit-bull "mauling" stories get more website hits and that leads to more advertising dollars. It's about the bottom line after all. They're running a business. You can't blame them for not fact checking. Sensationalized pit maulings = money. Retrievers biting people? Not so interesting.

Back to the labs. I think it is time that the City of Lakewood seriously consider adding Labrador Retrievers to the banned breed list. They are dangerous and we need to keep our streets safe. Since 2008 the city has protected us against pit-bull terrier mixes. I now call on Mayor Summers and the council to keep us safe from labs. It used to be Rottweilers, Shepherds, Dobermans and Pits. Now it's going to be the lab for the next 10 years or so until we figure out the next dog to demonize.

This is how the new lab ban would work. It would mirror the pit-bull terrier mix ban. If you currently have a lab, don't worry. You will be grandfathered in and will not have to leave the city or get rid of your family dog. However, your dog will have to follow different rules than other dogs. If you have a mutt that looks like a lab, an unreliable DNA test will be required. If your dog is determined to be 50.1% labrador retriever, it will be automatically considered dangerous. It doesn't matter if your lab has never hurt a human or another dog. It is automatically dangerous based on the way it looks. If your dog is 49.9% lab, don't worry. You and your dog are safe from discrimination. It is not dangerous.

If you are not a Lakewood resident but would like to move here and think that you have a dog that is over 50% lab, be careful. Send photos to Lakewood Animal Control first for visual approval by people trained on breed identification. If they are unsure, you will be required to get an unreliable DNA test



I get it. You're an average looking white person. You own a house and don't rent. Your lab is your family. Your children love it. They grew up with it. You love it. You rescued it. You paid lots of money for it. It's never hurt a fly. You can't just up and move out of the city you call your home. Blah, blah, blah. Save your breath people. The city's safety is at risk people! Watch the news! Forget the experts. Forget the science. Forget the studies that show breed bans don't make cities safer and end up costing tax payers a lot of money. Watch the local news and see what is happening out there. Do what is right for the community and reach out to your councilperson. Tell them you want the labs added to the banned breed list. Then mark your calendar for 10 years from now. Golden Retrievers are next.

Please love them all and help put an end to breed discriminatory legislation. I wish humans loved like pit-bulls.
