Students from Lakewood High School, the West Shore Career-Tech Media Art & Design program and Harding Middle School earned an impressively high number awards in the annual Scho-



lastic Art & Writing Awards regional competition held in December, including 17 of the highest-honor Gold Keys and 67 honored pieces overall.

One of the Gold Keys included the District's firstever portfolio award, earned by senior Elyza Mihalski, who also won three other Gold Keys for her work and two Silver Keys. The top award winner was senior Micah Inak with four Gold Keys, seven Silver Keys and three Honorable Mentions.

Other Gold Key winners are 8th grader Inga Wilhelmy of Harding; Lakewood High art students Jordan Bozak, Calvin Dolatowski, Solace Duval, Kazimir Klein, Emily Perry and Anastasia Seckers; and West Shore students Sara Bitter and Riley Geyer. Gold Key winners move on to be judged at the national level of the 93-year-old competition.

Lakewood students were also well-represented at the Silver Key and Honorable Mention levels. Thirteen students won



"Crescent City Crimes" Reveals New Orleans' Dark Side

New Orleans evokes images of the French Quarter, Cajun cuisine, revelers partying during Mardi Gras and jazz. Local author Charles Cassady, Jr. has a different take on the Big Easy in his book "Crescent City Crimes: Old New Orleans 1718-1918." He examines the first two centuries of the underbelly of New Orleans history - its pirates, smugglers, murderers and notorious red light district.


Cassady, a writer, critic and photographer, will present his newest book in the Main Library Auditorium on Tuesday, February 13 at 7 p.m. A graduate

of Syracuse University with a degree in Journalism, Cassady wrote radio comedy for the Cleveland City Club, ads for the International Film Festival and columns in three Cleveland-area newspapers, but he also made a habit of studying the occult and bizarre historical events. "Ripley's Believe-It-Or-Not" was a constant companion growing up. His fascination with the paranormal inspired him to write books about Cleveland ghosts and Great Lakes folklore, as well as "Paranormal Mississippi River."

Cassady's study of the Mississippi River led him to the subject of New Orleans and the publication of "Crescent City Crimes" in 2017. Founded in 1718 by the French, the city was sold to the United



chase. From its earliest days, New Orleans has been a stew of cultures and beliefs. Voodoo mixed with Catholicism; French, Native American, African and Creole populations; piracy; slavery – this unique mix created the city and its culture. In his book, Cassady calls the early history of New Orleans "200 years of being one of the most unique, colorful, maddening, and tempestuous and unconventional cities in the Union." "Crescent City Crimes" details some of that madness.

People in Joselin Linder's family have been dying from strange, agonizing symptoms for generations. Without diagnosis or cure, doctors and loved ones have had no choice but to watch helplessly as the same ruthless pattern took its deadly course time and again.

In Linder's new biography, "The Family Gene," she searches her family's past, struggles with her own coming of age and leans into the future of genetic research when she begins to suffer from the same telltale symptoms of her dad, great-uncle and great-grandmother.

The author is visiting Lakewood Public Library on Tuesday, February 6, 2018 at 7 p.m. as part of our Meet the Author series. The event takes place in the Main Library Basement Auditorium. Working on the Linder family's case for over twenty years is Dr. Christine Seidman, the head of a group of world-class genetic researchers at Harvard Medical School. The mystery begins to unfold when it is confirmed that fourteen of Joselin's relatives carried a brand new genetic mutation.

From biography to medical detective novel, "The Family Gene" will have you turning pages to answer how a family copes with such a deadly inheritance, if research finds a cure and whether Joselin emerges victor, victim or somewhere in the middle.

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torical façade of the East Rockport Central School building at 1456 Warren, where the Recreation Department was housed until recently.

Liberty will pay \$500,000 for the properties and plans to invest approximately \$8 million in renovations. State law dictates that the money be placed in a capital improvement fund. Work will begin first on the 1456 property, which will be renovated into modern office space. The Board must vacate that building by June 2018. Board employees will be able to remain in the 1470 Warren building until August 2019 under a lease agreement that includes six free months. After the 1456 Warren renovation is complete, the Board will have the option to lease the space for its Central Office operations. Besides preservation of the East Rockport building exterior, other parameters set out by the Board included:

the Board and Grant properties ensures a buffer will be created on the stretch of Victoria Avenue directly across from the school to minimize any additional traffic. While Liberty has not determined its plan for the 1470 property, it is likely that portion of the complex will become tax-paying space.

"The proposed contract allows us to remain in downtown Lakewood in renovated office space without going to voters for funding," said Superintendent Jeff Patterson. He also noted that the space for the Board's administrative operations will shrink from 30.000 square feet to 10,000 square feet, significantly cutting overall operating costs. Board President Edward Favre commented that he was pleased that the process to select a developer was consistent with what the Board said it would do at the outset of the Facilities Master Plan. "This deal accomplishes our goal of putting some of our property back into the tax base," Favre said. Liberty CEO & co-founder Tom Kuluris, whose company is developing McKinley Place, is eager to start his next Lakewood project: "We are very proud and honored to be selected ... and are very excited to bring this property to its next life."

We expect our search will result in another highly qualified Superintendent. As part of this process, there will be public listening sessions on January 17 and 18. We hope to announce who our new superintendent will be in March.

2018 will mark the completion of the rebuilding of every Lakewood City School; the largest construction project in the history of Lakewood. This 14-year process, delayed by the recession of 2008 and interruption of State facilities funding, affords Lakewood students and staff facilities second to none for high quality instruction and learning. Although the construction will be done, the challenge will now be to better care for and maintain these new facilities rather than band aid and get by with the old, worn out. Our community rightfully expects us to take good care of what we asked them to finance. If we hope for their continued support, we cannot fail to do so.

The relocation of the Recreation & Education Department to the high school continues the Board's 90-year commitment to recreation in Lakewood. The new Fitness Facility complements the other indoor facilities we previously committed for increased public use as part of the facilities project. The new indoor track is a vast improvement over the one many will recall was in the old West Gym of the 1918 Lakewood High School building. And, it also will be open to the public during non-instructional times. We again thank First Federal of Lakewood for partnering in our facilities.

Yet to be done is the relocation of Central Office on Warren Road. Moving the Recreation & Education Department to the high school campus reduces the amount of administrative square footage needed. We are working with a developer to keep and incorporate the historic 1879 Rockport School portion of the building and occupy it as an intermediate location. Going forward, we will also be considering the sale and disposition of the Taft Elementary site and future use of the 1907 Franklin Elementary building.

We are fortunate that Lakewood has outstanding teachers and support staff that do great work with our students. Lakewood teachers are second

all walks of life. We continue to offer many and varied programs and curriculars for all our students, regardless of their abilities, like no other district.

The District recently received a Universal Prekindergarten grant to increase the existing preschool program at Harrison Elementary. Such programs have been met with great acceptance and success. All day programs are growing and available in nearby schools and districts and we should seek to fund and move in that direction.

Unfortunately, we will continue to deal with Ohio's flawed state funding process for public education. 40 years ago, the State legislature created the flat funding process that guarantees deficits and has been declared unconstitutional 4 times. During that time, the State has increased requirements, increased questionable standards, and related costs. In addition, public education dollars have been diverted to private and often poorly run businesses that target easy to educate, profitable students. It's a decades long State fiasco that has created the inevitable need for school districts throughout Ohio to request additional local operating levies. 2018 is a state election year and now is the time to ask campaigning candidates what their plan is to repair the problem their predecessors created.

In these times of government mistrust, we will go the extra mile to be up front, open, honest, and candid with our community and constituents.

Going forward, maintaining what we have, and getting better at what we do, will be even more challenging. We are fortunate to have a committed community and talented people within the organization





Disclaimer: Record reviews are a tricky business. It's one thing to enjoy music, but to, like, pick out what you like about it? That being said, if I review your thing and I didn't like something, don't feel too bad. My opinion doesn't matter all that much.

Choke Chains - Trace Amounts -Heel Turn Records - 8 songs - LP

Heel Turn forgot my press release for this one, so to find out the "current/ past affiliations" for Choke Chains I had to turn to Discogs like some sort of commoner. So you've got Thomas Jackson Potter (Bantam Rooster), Lindsey Crappor (No Bails), Mark Millionaire (Chinese Millionaires), and bringing the Ohio connection (besides the fact that this is on Heel Turn), Chizz aka Chris Butler (no, not Chris Butler from The Waitresses, the one from Blank Schatz). I'm gonna have to admit here while these are all bands I know and have listened to at one point or another, I can't pretend that I'm that familiar with any of them. Not purposefully, I'm just not. So, if you want to hear how this compares to those current/past affiliations, I guess you can go read Termbo or something. I'll just do my best. Generally musically speaking, it's garage punk. Some tracks have a post-punk feel ("Richard Speck Lights Up The Room", "Don't Feel Feelings") and some of them almost get into 90s alt-rock territory (in a good way, though) ("The Tender Type," "I Want You To Know"). "If That Ain't A Sin" could almost be a Gaunt song, but it's too slow. The title tracks a real banger as well, the vocals especially get really frenzied. 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
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
