# **Skindell And Antonio Win Primaries**

Nickie J. Antonio and Michael J. Skindell will be Democrats' nominees to represent Lakewood in the Ohio General Assembly, following last Tuesday's primary.

Lakewood voters' overwhelming preference for Antonio over Martin Sweeney settled a fight between two state representatives, each seeking a nomination to run for Ohio Senate District 23. In recent weeks the matchup drew repeated notice from local media.

Sweeney closed Tuesday with modest leads in most of the senate district, which includes Lakewood, Parma, and other western suburbs as well as parts of Cleveland. But an outlier result in Lakewood, which voted more than 3-to-1 for Antonio, gave her an overall victory of more than 54%.

At the same time, state Senator Michael J. Skindell defeated Lakewood City Council member Tom Bullock to be Democrats' nominee for Ohio House District 13. Skindell won slightly more than 55%, both in Lakewood and the two Cleveland wards which constitute most of the district.

The result is the second such for Bullock, following a primary loss to Antonio in 2010, when both sought Democrats' nomination for the Ohio House.

Antonio as well as Skin-

dell are now ineligible to run for their current offices, owing to term limits, and both will seek to move between the two chambers of the General Assembly in November.

Each nominee will face a Republican opponent in the November election.

Democrats' sizable voter-

registration advantage in each district, however, will favor Antonio's and Skindell's campaigns.

If elected, Antonio will be the first woman to represent the 23rd Senate District, and the first openly gay member of the Ohio Senate.



#### You Are Entering The Twilight Zone: Life Lessons From A **Timeless Show**

You may have watched an episode of "The Twilight Zone" and laughed, shaken your head, cringed, cowered (in my case,) or been amazed at its ingenuity. But did you ever think of "The Twilight Zone" as a body of work from which you could draw countless life lessons? Author and critic Mark Dawidziak was inspired to do just that, resulting in his book, "Everything I Need to Know I Learned in the Twilight Zone: A Fifth-Dimension Guide to Life."

Dawidziak draws the reader in immediately with a welcoming and familiar tone. After an introduction that includes a biography of the show's creator Rod Serling, we are given a series of fifty life lessons, each using one or more "Twilight Zone" episodes to illustrate a point. # **Baby Thief Author Will** Sign Books At Library

It sounds like a nightmare: renowned social worker accused of kidnapping and selling babies. But this is no horror story; it's the true account of Georgia Tann, written by Lakewood author Barbara Bisantz Raymond.

For years, Georgia Tann was lauded as a Tennessee social worker who arranged adoptions from her children's

home in Memphis, Tennessee. She was praised for matching poor orphans with loving adoptive families. In reality, Tann was far from kind-hearted. She terrorized young unwed mothers into relinquishing their babies and even stole babies from some families. Tann would then sell the babies to wealthy clients including Joan Crawford and Dick Powell. Tann altered the babies' birth certificates, ostensibly to protect the adoptive families, but actually to make her crimes nearly impossible to trace.

An adoptive mother and investigative journalist, Barbara Bisantz Raymond recounts Tann's horrifying tale in her

book, "The Baby Thief: The Untold Story of Georgia Tann, the Baby Seller Who Corrupted Adoption." Raymond initially wrote about Tann in a magazine article which led to a 60 Minutes exposé on Tann. #### Hey, What's That You Got There? Huh?: Reviews Of Recent Releases By Local Bands, Pt. 70

Disclaimer: Record reviews are a tricky business. It's one thing to enjoy music, but to pick out what you like (or dislike) about it? That being said, if I review your thing and I didn't like something, don't feel too bad. My opinion doesn't matter all that much.

Cheap Clone - EP - Just Because Records / Peanut Butter Records - 4 songs - 7"

From what I gathered, there's not really an official title for this one. Is it self-titled? Is it "EP?" Is it "4 Songs?" Drew told me I could make up whatever I wanted, so make sure you visit a local record store and ask for "430 Eyes, One That Smiles." Anyway. The record kicks off in a real good way with "Barely Smile," which is a great power pop tune. Pretty harmonies, a tasteful guitar solo, a nice bridge; what more do you want? "This One/That One" has a total Replacements vibe. Does Roseanna sing the bridge or did Drew's voice get even higher? Speaking of other people singing, I believe Kevin takes the lead on "Isaac Newton's Eye," which reminds me a lot of "Isolation Drills." Jaworski has a knack for singing in a key that sounds like it's not quite in tune but still somehow works (listen to that Cripple Kid 7"). "430 Miles" closes it out with another great power pop tune. I like the stop-start bits, that's a nice touch. Maybe it's just because of the other members stepping up to the mic on certain songs here, but this one feels more like a group effort than previous efforts. Did you know I saw the phrase "cheap clone" out in the wild somewhere the other day? About a guitar or something? Huh. Nice cover art, too. The Just Because/Peanut Butter

#### ITEM - Sad Light - Bands Of The Dealer - 8 songs - CD, cassette, download

I think I may have reviewed some other ITEM release a few years ago, but I cannot remember what I thought of it. Anyway, I guess that doesn't really matter since this is the new one. I can tell you it's indie rock, but that doesn't really mean anything and it also probably sounds completely different from whatever I called indie rock last week. But it is a sort of reverb-heavy, mostly clean "alternative rock." If I say this sounds like a Mahall's band, does that mean anything to anybody? Probably not. Per the group's Bandcamp page, they're "art rock for depressed cowboys who love modulation," and once you combine that with a line from "Somersault" about a "bottle of absinthe, I spilled it on your synth," you'll probably get a feel for what these guys are about. Something makes me want to say that this sounds like Captured Tracks, but I also don't think I have ever listened to a single Captured Tracks release, so I have no idea why I would want to say that. My biggest gripe with this is that a lot of the tempos are in the same area (and it's a pretty slow area) and a lot of the instrumentation is similar. I'm not saying that it's samey so much as that they have a style that they stick to, and perhaps it's not my style. I don't wanna call it emo, but at the same time I know some of my emo-liking friends would

totally dig this. Sorta shoegazey at times, some artsy moves...I think you have to be in a certain mood to really feel this. One of my notes said "rainy day music." I think I could write this review on a different day and I would say entirely different things. But is that true of almost anything? I don't know. My highlights were the Beatlesque/60s psychedelia of the coda of "Somersault," "Witching Hour," which had a part that almost reminded me of Pulp but not quite, and "Green Bridge," which picks up the pace, has some nice jangly guitar that reminded me of "Tonight She

#### Lakewood's Bethany Toth Earns Degree After 'Clicking' With The Tri-C Public Safety Program

Bethany Toth randomly clicked on a link and opened the website for the Public Safety Center of Excellence at Cuyahoga Community College (Tri- $C^{\circledast}$ ).

Someone may eventually owe his or her life to that simple decision.

That online exploration two years ago reawakened Toth's childhood dream of working in law enforcement. The 20-year-old from Lakewood will graduate from Tri-C on May 17 with an Associate of Applied Science in Criminal Justice.

The degree marks the start of her planned career climb to become a police crisis negotiator, the person called in to defuse potentially deadly situations.

"Tri-C is my steppingstone," Toth said. "This is how I'm going to become that officer."

Toth enrolled at the College after that online search introduced her to the Public Safety Institute. She immersed herself in the criminal justice program and became a fixture at the KeyBank Public Safety Training Center.

Her work in and out of the classroom earned her a KeyBank Public Safety Scholarship from the College and an internship with the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office, where she spent last summer organizing evidence.

"I couldn't have asked for more from my experience at Tri-C," Toth said.

She plans to continue her studies with Tiffin University through a partnership that will allow her to complete a bachelor's degree in criminal justice administration while taking classes at Tri-C's Brunswick University Center.

After that, Toth intends to enroll in Tri-C's Police Academy to become a commissioned officer, putting her in a position to achieve her ultimate goal of becoming a crisis negotiator.

"I know that I'm someone who can bring a sense of relief to people and talk them off a ledge," Toth said. "When someone is in the worst situation, I want to be there for them. That's where I think I can make the biggest difference."
