vent for at least a decade. And City Hall knew this.

Lie #4: No worry, there is over \$120 million in new development coming to DowntowN Lakewood.

to what is inside or other properties and equipment connected to Lakewood Hospital.

City Hall, Mayor Summers, Kevin Butler, and Jenn Pae insist to this day that the City of Lakewood has no real claims to much of this, they say that they doubt that the City could prove ownership for the equipment, the services, outlying property, or funds held in the Foundations.

Proven Fact: The truth was known by City Hall back in March of 2015. In fact, the City of Lakewood, Cleveland Clinic, LHA, Subsidium, and another consultant agreed, in writing, to the following: The City of Lakewood (i.e., the residents) owned every bit of every-



thing associated with the hospital. The land, the buildings, the equipment, the goods and services, and the money to fund it to keep it going. All belonged to the people of Lakewood. When asked, Mayor Summers, Kevin Butler, and Jenn Pae still lie about this. For 3.5 years they hid the documents that stated this.

This document alone might have won the residents' lawsuit to slow down the hospital deal in order to negotiate a better one - or even have saved Lakewood Hospital.

And documents show City Hall knew this all along.

The small portion of the documents finally released by City Hall demonstrate one other thing: this City Hall is inept - or arguably the most corrupt administration in Lakewood's history. The released documents prove that Lakewood City Hall and their supporters not only made the worst possible deal, they did so while lying to Lakewood residents about virtually every aspect of it. They chose the one deal that gave Lakewood residents the least, and gave the most to friends and supporters of Summers and FitzGerald.

One recently released document proves that instead of a \$250 million dollar potential win for the City of Lakewood, they turned it into a \$250 million dollar loss for Lakewood while getting land and millions of dollars for


Legends Of China: Culture And Poetry Presented By Professor Shunqin Li







I Haven't Buzzed Off Just Yet: Reviews Of Recent Releases By Local Bands, Pt. 85

Mr. California & The State Police - The State Police Featuring Members Of Mr. California - self-released? - 21 songs - cassette

This tape is, I suppose, Mr. California's last release as an Ohioan, as he's gone back to California for the time being. The title of this tape is actually pretty accurate, because most of the songs on here are instrumentals that don't exactly "feature" Terry, the man known as Mr. California, but instead his backing band/drum machine The State Police. The two tracks that have vocals are "Like To Get High" and "BLS," both pretty okay songs. The issue arises from the fact that a good few of these sound like typical Mr. C and The State Police songs with the vocals missing, which just kinda makes you go, "well, where are the lyrics?" That's not to say that there aren't songs on here that hold their own as instrumentals. The best of the bunch are the ones that sound like demented video game soundtracks, like "Sledding Up The Mountain," "Good Morning, Saint," and "Sonic On Acid And Speed," which could actually be the music from Sonic, I really have no idea. Definitely not the place to start with Mr. California, but if you've always wanted to hear more of his instrumental/compositional capabilities, this is for you. Also worth buying for any Mr. California fan for the insert alone.

(I don't even know who put this out or where to get it. Try a local record store?)

Queen Of Hell - Queen Of Hell II - Phoenician MicroSystems - 8 songs - LP, digital

The Queen returns with a full album- and this time, there are three bass players on it! Sadly, not all at once, but still. I think that this time around, the band sounds more "focused" or some reviewery term like that; it's a more cohesive sound instead of going all over the place. This is not in any way to disparage the first record, which I think is totally great. There's a good few absolute rippers, like the opening track "The Soul Exchange," the more glam-sounding "Ball Drivin' Insane," and especially "Death II Die," which is the centerpiece of the album as far as I'm concerned (it goes to this slow jam with a bass solo and clarinet and all this and it really lays it into you and then rips right back into the song-you really gotta hear it). "Queen Of My Nitemares" is a good heavy response to Heavenly Queen's "Queen Of My Dreams"- I thought they might just do the former song with different lyrics, but no, it's totally its own thing (and hey, speaking of, when is the Queen Of Hell version of "White Vines" coming out?). "The Path To Zen" is a weird closer, since it's real mellow and reverbheavy with jazzy guitar playing, but at the same time it works really well.



There are plenty of shredding guitar parts, sorta-ridiculous but at the same time great lyrics, great driving rhythm section moments, and just a general sense that this band knows how to have fun, which I think is really important to have in music. Here's the bad part: the mastering for the vinyl version of this is...look, to be harsh, it's not good. It's very flat. I know this isn't my place to say, really, I'm just here to talk about the music itself, but it's gotta be particularly bad for me to take notice of it when I know that's not what I'm supposed to be doing. The only way to get anything at all out of it is to really crank it up. "Aha!" the Queen bellows back at me. "But you should be playing it at maximum volume anyway, so no harm done!" But look, if I'm playing a record that loud, I want it to sound great. I don't want to have to do that just to make it so I'm not distracted by how flat it is. I haven't used my download code yet (which involves emailing

the band and probably something about a blood sacrifice), but I'm told that the digital version doesn't have this problem. I'm entirely loath to recommend a digital version of anything ever, so I'm just putting these facts out there. Or you can buy the record and turn it all the way up and kill everyone in the surrounding area (and I mean that in a good way), it's your call. Oh, and the title of this one might not be "II" but "Upside Down Cross Upside Down Cross," but I couldn't figure out how to type that. God save the Queen. **4/5**

LakewoodAlive has teamed with Empowering and Strengthening Ohio's People (ESOP) to offer free tax preparation and filing to working low-income families and individuals on Saturday, March 2. "Super Saturday" takes place from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Harrison Elementary School in Lakewood's Historic Birdtown Neighborhood (2080 Quail Street).

Call 2-1-1 today to schedule your appointment to have your taxes done for free by one of ESOP's certified tax preparers. Walk-ins are welcome but will be seen after all scheduled appointments.

The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Program provides free tax preparation to working low-income individuals and families by trained, certified volunteers through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program. Tax preparers will help participants receive their full income tax refund - as much as \$6,431 in refund monies utilizing electronic filing and direct deposit.

Tax Credit Eligibility Guidelines for Tax Year 2018:

· Families with three or more qualifying children who earned less than \$49,194 in 2018 (or less than \$54,884 for married filing jointly) are eligible for a credit of up to \$6,431.

· Families with two qualifying children who earned less than \$45,802 in 2018 (or less than \$51,492 for married filing jointly) are eligible for a credit of up to \$5,716.

· Families with one qualifying child who earned less than \$40,320 in 2018 (or less than \$46,010 for married filing jointly) are eligible for a credit of up to \$3,461.

· Individuals who do not have a qualifying child, but are between the ages of 25 and 64, with earned income of less than \$15,270 in 2018 (or less than \$20,950 for married filing jointly) are eligible for a credit up to \$519.

Participants should bring the following items on March 2: IRS 2018 W2s and 1099s, Social Security Cards for all family members, governmentissued photo of each person signing the return, childcare expense statement including the provider's Tax ID number, bank account and routing numbers for direct deposit of refund and last year's tax return, if possible.


