On a cold and rainy day Lakewoodites gathered at Lakewood Park for our annual celebration of veterans and all they have done for the country.



# THE MAYOR'S CORNER

## Lakewood's Innovative Integrated Wet Weather Improvement Plan by Mayor Meghan George

One thing we all love about Lakewood is the charming, historic character of our city - but we also understand that with age comes an increased need for upgrades, repairs, and maintenance. And these things can be costly. Unfortunately, when it comes to our infrastructure, Lakewood is currently facing the challenge of having water and sewer systems that are over a century old.

You may have read or seen the news about the needed repairs for the sewer system infrastructure. However, this is not new. The City of Lakewood has been working on addressing these challenges for well over a decade – performing research and analysis, engaging in innovative planning, and working hand-in-hand with the US EPA to come

up with an approach to address overflows of our sewer lines during storm events. This month, we were pleased to announce that the City had entered into a partial consent decree with the federal government that formalizes elements of the City's Integrated Wet Weather Improvement Plan (IWWIP), which was adopted by the City in early 2019.

Lakewood is the first place in Ohio to adopt an Integrated Wet Weather Improvement Plan (IWWIP). We also were able to convince the EPA that our IWWIP was the best way to address the problems we are facing. In fact, the terms of the consent decree are based on Lakewood's own plan - so rather than the EPA dictating terms of what will happen, the City was able to come up with its own approach that suits our unique system and needs. That is highly uncommon and shows that Lakewood is a leader in this area.

As part of the consent decree, the City has formalized its previously planned investment of \$86 million in sewer improvement projects. Last year, the City committed \$25 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars to its efforts to achieve the IWWIP, which will help address the costs related to the consent decree. The City has also agreed to pay a modest civil penalty for this type of case of \$100,000. For comparison sake, the City of Elyria just entered a similar agreement with the EPA, and the fine involved is two times the amount Lakewood must pay. While we would have preferred no fine, the law man-

dates we had to pay something, and we believe that our comparatively low fine shows that Lakewood's innovative and cooperative approach to solving these problems was recognized by the EPA.

By implementing our IWWIP and the consent decree, Lakewood is finally addressing a problem that has exposed our city and ratepayers to liability for many years. By moving forward, we will protect the waters of both the Rocky River and Lake Erie while bringing our city into compliance with state and federal law. This is another important step that improves the local environment and shields the ratepayers of Lakewood from exposure to daily fines from the federal government in the future. My administration will continue to keep you informed on this major project as it is implemented.

# Dear Residents Of Lakewood And Members Of Lakewood City Council

It is again my privilege to present you with the City of Lakewood's 2023 proposed balanced budget, reflecting our community vision, values, and priorities while also remaining fiscally responsible in our operations and objectives. We enter 2023 maintaining a strong financial position and enjoying an excellent Aa2 Moody's bond rating. I remain confident that we will work through the financial challenges that the 2023 economy will likely present while continuing to provide residents with first-class services and transformative projects and initiatives in 2023:

# Public Infrastructure and Environmental Interventions

Interceptor Tunnel Project: The City will begin a massive project on its main, 100-year-old 3.6-mile artery of sanitary sewer pipe that flows across northern Lakewood before going south to the City's wastewater treatment plant. We are cleaning, repairing, and "sliplining" the pipe, while also adding access maintenance shafts. This project is part of the City's multi-year plan for stormwater management compliance with the federal Clean Water Act. The City is dedicating \$25 mil-

lion in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to keep costs as reasonable as possible for our utility rate payers.

#### Parks & Public Spaces

Foster Pool: Construction continues at Foster Pool to realize the community vision developed from extensive community input in the redesign of this beloved Lakewood asset. It's a project that will resolve long-term maintenance issues including severe water loss from leakage, while also incorporating new features that create a more useful and friendly environment for people of all ages and abilities.

Parks & Fields: At Lakewood Park, the City will upgrade and expand the heavily used skate park and make major upgrades and address maintenance at Lakefront Field as the ballfield management program continues. Various capital projects will also take place at Kauffman, Merl, and Niagara Parks.

# Public Safety and Energy Efficiency

Alternative Energy Vehicles: The City continues to replace older, less efficient combustion engine models with hybrid police vehicles that enjoy significant fuel savings and come with a generous warranty that dramatically reduces maintenance costs. Additionally, the City is strategically targeting certain vehicle replacement candidates for its allelectric vehicles as our fleet of alternative energy vehicles continues to diversify.

Fire and Police Equipment: The Ohio Emergency Management Agency has awarded Lakewood nearly \$250,000 for necessary upgrades to our police and fire radio equipment. We will use over \$1 million in ARPA funds to backfill the remaining costs of this important proj-

ect that helps keep our community safe and our local taxes as low as possible. In addition, vital dollars are being dedicated to increasing our citywide safety camera program to both deter and help solve crimes occurring in Lakewood.

I close with special thanks to the City's award-winning finance team and senior departmental staff who worked collaboratively in creating a budget that makes a difference in the lives of all Lakewood residents. I look forward to continuing to provide superior public service to our residents as we modernize and transform our vibrant and dynamic community.



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

# Reviews Of Recent Releases By Local Bands, Pt. 128

Joey Nix - Another Way To Do It - Just Because Records - 15 songs - LP, digital

This is my third time around with this record— I had the cassette two years ago and I had the CDr two years before that (it was called "Hardcore Bedtime" back then and was missing a song or two, as I recall). I think I've only reviewed it once before, but who knows. In any case, I am totally happy to review it again and elated it's finally really out (the cassette was fine but unavailable to purchase anywhere that I could find; the CD I think Joey may have just given out to people at shows) because it is a very, very good album. Joey's thing is a sort of lo-fi power pop with garage-y leanings, but differs from a lot of music in this category because it all seems very acoustic guitar-heavy, even when it's with electric guitar. This is not the best way of explaining this but I hope it gets the point across that there's something special going on here. "Souled At 17" is a great opener where you immediately get an idea of what a good songwriter Joey is (and he can really sing, too perhaps it isn't as immediately noticeable as it was in Shitbox Jimmy, but you can still tell). Things get strange on track two, "Purple Peet" with a bass that plays one note the whole song (giving it an unsettling intensity) and some semi-tuned violin (or viola, not sure) which is immediately reminiscent of "Blimps Go 90" by Guided By Voices, who I would have to assume are



famously rarely have any clue what Joey is singing (see previous reviews) and when I can make it out I don't really know what it means but I love the line "the hole I'm filling I dug up this morning" in "Jousting." "Misty Green Car," "Milkstand," and "Machine: Baloo Song" each have in their own different ways some kind of resemblance to the Kinks—it's a good trick to be able to make someone think of Ray Davies in multiple styles. I would have to assume that Joey likes the Kinks and the Beatles quite a bit (he and his band did "Ticket To Ride" at the release show and it was incredible) and the slower parts on "Machine" sound like if a Big Star record were recorded and produced like a Bill Fox record. Hey, maybe that's not too far off. I love "Small Reward," which is like power pop here but was more psychedelic live and the vocal delivery is especially good here, like on the lines "it must be hard to have everything, to have everything" and "without the cash, where would you be? Stocking cans in a pet store!" The way

the third guitar comes in with these big power chords is a total Paul Westerberg move. "Bugs And Bob" feels the most outwardly power poppin' of all of these and I think it's because the drums are a little more forceful. It also has some really good little guitar leads and a great bass part (for a record that would probably by most people be considered lo-fi and that at times sounds a little ramshackle, all the arrangements and production moves definitely show real thought put into them- Joey (and co-conspirator Jared Phillips, the other major contributor to this record) certainly understand the importance of dynamics). Yes, maybe I should hate "DJ Man" because it's a novelty, but it's too charming. I think Joey's doing a German accent? Not sure. "Nixx Shuffle" is spooky, not just in instrumentation but in the lyrics I can pick up. A lost guitar solo wanders in for a moment and then disappears again. Musically, there are certainly some GBV tricks here (also note the abrupt GBV fade on "Jousting"). I guess one would call "Bricks" a ballad—great melody and "ooh la la" backing vocals. "Fly's Place" returns

us to the Kinks Kamp with some Chilton moves sprinkled in. I'm sure I already said this in my original review but I love "Jobs" a lot—it's such a sweet little song and hits me emotionally the same way certain Donovan songs do. Nice harmonica, too. "Trust?" is a good driving power pop song (good guitar leads and backing vocals again) with a great two-part bridge, first where it builds up and gets loud and then when it hits the key change and the guitar lead follows the vocal melody— brilliant. I think "Shiny Wheels" is a perfect moody closer where Joey's murmured, mumbled vocals fit perfectly and once again I'm reminded a lot of solo Paul Westerberg at his best. Maybe this is just a record that's geared towards my sensibilities anyway, but I think it's fantastic. People should hear this and I'm glad more people will get a chance to now. 5/5

#### Lakewood Resident, Leslie Gentile, Esquire, To Receive 2022 Community Impact Award

The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland will host its 117th Annual Meeting on Friday, December 2, 2022 at 2:00 p.m. at the Renaissance Hotel in downtown Cleveland. Legal Aid's annual event will highlight hope, extend gratitude, and provide updates on high-impact community partnerships and initiatives. Additionally, Legal Aid leaders will unveil the organization's new strategic plan.

Dr. Henry Louis Gates, Jr. will share reflections on Legal Aid's work to promote fairness, racial equity, and social justice. Dr. Gates is the Alphonse Fletcher University Professor and Director of the Hutchins Center for African & African American Research at Harvard University. As an Emmy and Peabody Award-winning filmmaker, Dr. Gates has produced and hosted more than 20 documentary films, most recently "The Black Church" on PBS and "Black Art: In the Absence of Light" for HBO. His groundbreaking genealogy series, "Finding Your Roots," has been on PBS for eight seasons.

Dr. Gates joins a distinguished list of past Legal Aid keynote speakers, including U.S. Supreme Court Associate Justice Sonia Sotomayor, U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown, and most recently, U.S. Attor- ney General Merrick Garland, who have highlighted the importance of civil legal aid at past events.

Legal Aid's Annual Meeting is a chance for philanthropists, community members, nonprofit organizations, and

business leaders to gather and reflect on Legal Aid's accomplishments over the past year, as well as learn about bold new initiatives and plans for the year ahead.



# **Director Roman Ducu** Wins Award, **Announces Retirement**

He had just won the 2021 Clyde "Butch" Seidle Public Works Servant Leader Award, basically the Oscar for public service employees. It was nice to hear that a good guy had won. Roman is a buck stops here kind of guy, which is good as he is often the person people in the city want to hear from most. Because he grew into the job, he carries the responsibilities as well as the talent and background to coordinate Public Works and capital improvement projects, reviewing equipment defects, prioritizing repairs, and selecting and managing suppliers or contractors and costs.

Mr. Ducu also holds a Class A Commercial Driver's license, cleared all the way up to a tanker truck, a motorcycle license, and is close to obtaining his private helicopter license, and can legally operate a drone as certified by the FAA.

Currently he is proudest of the city sidewalk replacement program. As Roman points out, in a city that advertises itself as the most walkable city in the area, we better have safe sidewalks for the walking. In fact, businesses in Lakewood would die if everyone had to drive to get there.

The other thing he is most proud of is his crews, managers and employees. When I asked about the award, he didn't want to say anything. Then he called and said, if we talk about the crews, and allowed them to be highlighted, he would spend the time and talk.

After I had spent some time with Roman, and saw first hand the crews he is so proud of, he turned to me and said that he will be retiring in the early months of 2023.

These cooking demos are just part of a larger program with the goal of helping individuals and families to eat healthier by introducing them to inexpensive and readily available ingredients that will raise the nutritional value of the meals they can prepare at home. 

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
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
