Thank you to my fellow Board members. They have operated in the best tradition of Lakewood Boards by demonstrating commitment to and respect for our students, staff and the Lakewood community. Each member of the Board brings unique skills, experiences and perspectives that enable the Board to operate in the very best interest of all our students and the school family that supports them. School board members must work together if they are to be effective, and individual members must work hard to understand all aspects and

all implications of the actions being considered or adopted. Mutual respect has been a hallmark of successful Lakewood Boards, and the members of this Board have certainly met that standard.

Thank you to Superin-

tendent Niedzwiecki for her leadership and for the superior team she has assembled. The Superintendent and her team have maintained a consistent focus on the goals of the organization - on academic rigor and excellence and the well-being of each individual student. They have kept the District on target while navigating the multiple issues that arise on a daily basis. They have worked every day to make each child's life better, happier and safer.

Thank you to Treasurer Zeman and the excellent team he has assembled. His integrity and his determination to support District initiatives while maintaining fiscal stability has been invaluable. He

has provided oversight of the utilization of the federal relief funds. These funds have been very helpful to us in addressing pandemic-related expenses including those programs addressing learning loss. The installation of a new payroll system by his staff has benefitted our staff and improved operational efficiencies.

This year has been a year of District action on numerous fronts. A strategic plan has been developed with significant input from the Board, staff, parents and community; and during the past year, specific measurable goals were identified and initiated. THE MAYOR'S CORNER

Focusing On Housing Affordability

We in Lakewood often refer to our community as the City of Beautiful Homes. It's a well-earned title that we work to maintain and build upon. But another focus for our team at City Hall is to keep Lakewood's status as a place where people can find a home they can afford, whether they are owning or renting. That focus on affordability is important for a city that takes pride in welcoming people from all backgrounds, in all stages of life, and of all incomes.

That focus on affordability takes many shapes for the team at City Hall. One key aspect is maintaining high quality housing stock while continuing to offer diverse housing options. Our planning department continues to implement our affordable housing strategy, which was recognized with a Vibrant NEO Champion Award.

The City recently established a relationship with the Lincoln Institute by Mayor Meghan George

of Land Policy, a national nonprofit dedicated to improving quality of life through the effective use, taxation, and stewardship of land that provides research, training, education, and policy solutions. The Lincoln Institute selected the City to pilot an exploratory scenario planning toolkit developed for them by Professor Arnab Chakraborty and Emma Walters of the University of Illinois.

Lakewood's pilot use of this toolkit is helping to develop a national model for legacy cities like Lakewood that are working to address issues impacting their communities, such as market pressures pushing prices higher and raising concerns for affordability. On January 20th, our planning department hosted a workshop session with residents to gather input and insights. The session was

led by the Greater Ohio Policy Center, who has been tapped by the Lincoln Institute to assist in the use of the toolkit. The meeting generated excellent dialogue that will continue to move this work forward, and our planning department will issues a report in the coming months. Thank you to both the Lincoln Institute and the Greater Ohio Policy Center for their guidance and support.

As we work on innovative solutions, the City remains committed to and focused on a dual track of preserving existing affordable units and adding new affordable homes through our policy making and implementation. That includes tying City incentives in new developments of scale to including affordable units, as well as the City positioning land for affordable projects like recently built owner-occupied infill homes on Plover

and Shaw and investing in the repair, rehab, and expansion of affordable housing units like the EDEN project on Nelson Court.

Our approach also includes facilitating private development of new market rate units, which relieves market pressure on our existing housing stock. By working with developers to introduce a diversity of new units from the infill cluster homes currently under construction on the former gas station on Lake Avenue to larger scale housing projects moving ahead by developers along major corridors like Studio West at West 117th and Detroit and Solove at Bunts and Detroit.

By being innovative with our policies, aggressive with our use of limited public dollars dedicated to this issue, and creative in our work with private developers, Lakewood can continue its tradition of being a place for everyone to find a home.



The BEST that American High School sports has to offer is senior night. It helps when the home team wins—the Rangers did defeat a stubborn Parma squad 58-52—but the celebration goes beyond the final score. Tonight, Osied Albadarin, Myles Harper and Brayden Volcansek were honored not for being outstanding team players—which they are—but for being Lakewood Rangers, and for logging the endless hours of practice it takes to see varsity minutes. Both Osied (8 points) and Brayden (9 points) played key roles tonight, but more to the point they both have steadily improved their games over their four years at LHS and are part of a storied tradition. They richly earned this moment.

But perhaps the "moment" of the night was the essentially "ceremonial" start by Myles Harper, a program pillar who had his season cut short by injury less than halfway through. Here's hoping that the pain of this cruel twist of fate will be southed by the memories of the scores of classmates who chanted his name tonight.

The game itself was a microcosm of the season for Brayden and Osied. Brayden hit 3 silky smooth 3-pointers—all coming at crucial times when Parma had cut into the Ranger lead.



Osied also had clutch baskets, but as always was tenacious defensively and on the boards. Sophomore Luke Vannucci, who converted a critical driving "and one" three point play early in the 4th that stemmed Parma's momentum, was fabulous tonight, scoring 20 to lead Lakewood. Junior Drew Jablonowski scored 11, grabbed 10 rebounds, and hit critical free throws down the stretch. Sophomore Lucas Seguine also his four key free throws late and scored 6. Juniors Jack Gowan and Dominic Peck chipped in two and played tough defense. The win was fun and hard fought, but was a side note tonight.

Coach Cammock summed it up best in his message to the team. "As you grow older, I hope you can look back fondly on this time as having had a significant on how to tackle life's challenges, setbacks and successes, and how to compete ethically and fairly. January 21 Lakewood vs. Normandy

Without a strong bench, led by senior Aya McAuliffe who delivered important rebounds and 14 pointsmostly on key 4th quarter baskets—the Lakewood Rangers (12-5, 9-1 GLC East) would not have won today (49-46), and Normandy would have remained undefeated in the GLC. Junior reserve guard Sophia Zarbo, who logged extra duty when a Ranger went down early with an injury, scored 8 and handled the Invaders pressure well the whole game. Juniors Ally Bookman and Lucy Henrikson, along with seniors Jacquie Hudak and Nettle Doran did not score, but all played stout defense and handled the ball well.

Junior Delaney Garcia led all scorers with 16 points, had 12 rebounds, and helped limit the output of Normandy's top scorers. Senior guard Sam Hudak scored 6, even with early foul trouble, played tenacious defense (a Hudak hallmark) and hit late free throws to secure the win. Senior Ava Carroll chipped in with 5 points. This was a great team win, led by 2 players—Delany Garcia and Aya McAuliffe (Pictured second from left with all LHS seniors) —who are a part of a rich Lakewood basketball family tradition,

each as the third "sister" to wear the Purple and Gold. (Jessica and Bridgette Garcia. Asia and Giana McAuliffe). Of course, all the sisters are frequent fans at our games, cheering on the youngest. Sophomore Stephen McAuliffe plays on the Ranger Boys team. Speaking of the boys, their overtime 2-point loss to undefeated Holy Name, combined with today's nail-biter, made for a thrilling weekend of basketball for the squads from 44107. Both teams played meaningful games on the road, showed great heart, and represented LHS with pride. A tipped ball, a call, one play here or there—made the difference in both games. One result was favorable—and the other wasn't—but the commonalty is two community based teams putting it all on the line with maximum effort. Instead, a three point bombardment, led by Drew Jablonowski (27 points), along with senior Brayden Volcansek and point guard Luke Vannucci ended the drama early. Senior Oised Albadaran continued his excellent play on both ends, providing energy, rebounds, points and defense. In fact, this was a game that highlighted the key roles that so many players have assumed in the Lakewood winning streak. Junior Dominc Peck did not score, but he played strong defense and set up others. Junior Jack Gowan and came of the bench to provide rebounds, score points, and play tough defense. Sophomore Lucas Seguine provided strong ball handling and again scored coming off the bench, as if sophomore Peter Checkett. Lakewood has a big hill to climb on Friday at Holy Name, and there are no guarantees that the 5 game GLC winning streak will continue. But history tells us that the 44107 guys won't back down, and will fight the whole game.



Senator Antonio Assumes Senate Minority Leader Role And Shares Legislative Priorities

As we embark on the new 135th General Assembly, I look forward to the work ahead. I'm pleased to report that I have been elected to serve as the upcoming Senate Minority Leader. I will continue to represent Senate District 23 which includes Lakewood, Parma, Parma Heights, Cleveland, and Bratenahl. As I reflect on the activities of the state legislature this past year, I'm proud of the work that we have done on behalf of our communities, with so many members of our communities.

My legislative priorities for this upcoming 135th General Assembly include fully funding the Fair School Funding Plan, abolishing the death penalty by replacing it with life without parole in capital cases and passing the LGBTQ Fairness Bill.

Abolish Death Penalty legislation is joint-sponsored with Senator Steve Huffman (R-Tipp City) and co-sponsored with bipartisan support. There are myriad reasons to end the death penalty including the fact that executions are currently impossible to administer and use of the death penalty is flawed and has been shown to be falsely discharged as indicated by Ohio's now 11 death row exonerees. As Ohio welcomes the exciting new manufacturing giant Intel and continues to seek the best and the brightest from around the country and our state, I will continue to advance the Ohio Fairness Act. This bill has bipartisan support and would provide protections in employment, housing and the public sphere for LGBTQ Ohioans. Supported by the Ohio Chamber of Commerce

and over a thousand Ohio businesses, it will help in statewide efforts to retain and attract the best and brightest employees and encourage our young people to live, work and raise their families in Ohio.

Another key bill that I will reintroduce is to end the statute of limitations on rape and sexual assault. Under the current Ohio Revised Code, pros-

ecution against a perpetrator of rape or sexual battery must begin within 25 years after the commission of or attempt to commit the crime. Contained within my bill is the elimination of any instance of an offense against a victim. Now, more than ever, the public is on the side of removing the artificial line in the sand that prevents a survivor from coming forward to report such emotionally traumatic and violent experiences, especially because every survivor processes their trauma in their own time.

As we move into the new General Assembly, we will share our caucus priorities on the general fund budget and key legislation. As always, my office looks forward to continuing to serve you in the New Year. Reviews Of Recent Releases By Local Bands, Pt. 130 (Part 2)

V-3 - No One Speaks My Language Here - Bravecloud Records - 11 songs - LP

V-3 - Hit Dead Center With My Disease - Bravecloud Records - 10 songs - LP

V-3 - The Enemy Within - Bravecloud Records - 11 songs - LP

I have mixed feelings about some of the more Nudge Squidfish-centric material on here (and I say this as a Nudge fan)—some of it is great ("Metal Or Meat?" and "The Enemy Within"), but some of it feels out of place, or more like it's just Squidfish solo material that happened to feature someone else from the band on it so it got included in here. Who knows—I have no insight into how Squidfish organizes his tapes. Charles Cicirella (who, as far as I can tell, was never in V-3) makes an appearance

on one song here, "Game Of Sport," and it's pretty weird but also pretty entertaining. There are several tracks from a 1992 Jim Shepard solo project scattered throughout these—my favorite of those is probably "Swim Across The Ocean." On "The Enemy Within" (record 3 if you go by catalog number) there's a track of Jim talking about the formation of V-3 and it is a weird track— I noted this when I reviewed the "Heavy Action" compilation a few years ago, but his speaking style, at least when he's being recorded, is so strange and selfconscious and though he's just talking about the origins of the band it somehow feels like it gives you an insight into his personality.

I'm happy to have all of these, but I do wonder why they chose to release them as three separate LPs all at once—that's certainly a harder sell than one double LP (and, while there's nothing here I'd call unlistenable or uninteresting, I think the overall track selection could've been pared down to fit) and

can be kind of overwhelming going in. The liner notes for these (one side of the sheet is specific to each record, the other is a summary of the whole thing) by Nudge himself are kinda strange it feels a lot like self-fashioning (and I know from elsewhere Squidfish does a lot of that - not that I blame him, he is an artist after all) in a strange place; there's a sort of bitter tone when he talks about how this is the real V-3 as opposed to the later lineup with Leland Cain and Sam Brown and it almost, whether intentionally or not, reads like he's accusing Jim of having sold out on later records (personally, I love the later V-3 stuff, so maybe that makes me some kind of normie poser). That said, I can't fault him or anyone else for having complicated thoughts on Jim given how sadly the story ends. It is very clear, both from what Squidfish says here and from other things I've read and heard, that Jim really was supportive of his friends, both artistically and personally, in a way that really touched

them. It's nice to read that and then get to hear the fruits of that support here.

I'm not gonna do a rating for these, because I don't know how I would really work it out. Instead, I'll give a ranking of the three. My favorite as a standalone record was "Hit Dead Center With My Disease," so that's the first one I would try (if you're doing these one by one). After that, "The Enemy Within" was a good mix of a lot of different stuff. I would put "No One Speaks My Language Here" last because, though there are several excellent tracks on it, it is definitely the least consistent of the three. Long live Jim, long live Roxanne, long live V-3.

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
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
